Heritage Lottery Fund bids being prepared - have your say

Merton Council is preparing two Heritage Lottery Fund grant applications which could transform our local area. A Townscape Heritage Initiative grant would focus on the businesses and buildings around the Cricket Green end of London Road including the Vestry Hall complex. A Parks for People grant would concentrate on the Canons and surrounding open spaces.

We are already involved in these projects and are working with Friends of the Canons and the Mitcham Society. We want to ensure a partnership with the community at all stages of the process. We believe new building and structures should only be considered if they enhance the open spaces that are a key part of the Canons, and nothing proposed should change the special character of the heart of the Conservation Area.

Both grant applications will be submitted in August. There will be a range of opportunities to have your say. These include a picnic at the Canons on 1 June from noon, and a stall at the Mitcham Carnival next to ours. More details at www.canonspartnership.org.

The **Wilson Health Centre**, in the grounds of the Wilson Hospital, has been granted an extension to its temporary planning permission pending replacement by a Mitcham Local Care Centre. We supported the planning application, asking that intrusive lighting in the car park be toned down and requesting the provision of adequate cycle lockup facilities. We made suggestions for **Merton Council's Scrutiny process.**

Scrutiny allows the council to ensure the councillors who make the majority of decisions (the cabinet) are held to account for decisions and their impact upon the borough and its residents. Read our suggestions at our web site http://bit.ly/1jwD6d8.

Brook House, which faces onto Cricket Green, is set to become flats under new legislation that lets the owners of office buildings convert them without applying for planning permission. Whilst we recognise the need for new homes, we believe Cricket Green road is not appropriate as the main route in to Brook House, and have asked that subdued lighting be used. Work has started to **convert Justin Plaza into flats**. The owner of this office complex has the same rights for conversion as Brook House. The building complex is large, and we are disappointed that yet more bulk is being added to the frontage. This will result in an unsatisfactory, blocky appearance to the new flats which could have been avoided.

New wildflower beds have been set into the grass around the Vestry Hall and elsewhere in Mitcham. These have been created as part of Merton's World War I commemorations, and should be a mass of poppies over the summer months.

Merton Memories web site is a fantastic trip back in time

We were delighted to be part of the launch of the Merton Memories web site on 22 March, and then to have a stall and give a talk about our work and the things that make Mitcham special at the Discovery Day on 26 April. This attracted more than 2,000 visitors.

Funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, Merton Memories is a web site that makes 15,000 historic photos of our borough easily accessible for the first time. London in Bloom

We have once again entered the Cricket Green Conservation Area in the It's Your Neighbourhood section of the London in Bloom competition. We entered for the first time last year and were pleased to receive a 'Developing' award.

Judging takes place in July. Everyone can participate in the competition by putting plants on balconies, tidying front gardens, planting hanging baskets and generally brightening up their own 'patch'.

The Cricketers pub - again

The future of the Cricketers pub hangs in the balance again. A planning application has been submitted to add to the existing building and use the ground floor for shops. We anticipate a second planning application asking for permission to demolish the pub and replace it with a much larger block of flats.

These two applications come despite the owner already having permission to convert the existing building into flats and three earlier attempts at demolition having been turned down. Read comments on the planning application at our web site http://bit.ly/1joKnx6.

Keeping an eye on the Bull

We are aware that the old Bull pub on Church Road, which has been empty for some years, has building work going on inside.

As we write, we are awaiting confirmation of what the work is, though we have heard that the pub may be converted into flats.

The building is locally listed, and its frontage, which includes some lovely tiling, makes an important contribution to the Conservation Area. We have written to the Borough Conservation Officer, asking her to ensure the frontage is not damaged or lost as part of the works.
