

CRICKET GREEN CHARTER

Consultation report April 2019

1. This note summarises the community engagement activity for the refresh of the Cricket Green Charter and the feedback received.

Engagement activity

- 2. A refresh of the 2013 Cricket Green Charter was <u>announced</u> as part of the 50th anniversary celebrations of Mitcham Cricket Green Conservation Area.
- 3. An initial draft was publicised and feedback requested by Easter 2019. A final draft was produced for Mitcham Cricket Green Community & Heritage's AGM in April 2019 and feedback requested by the Mitcham Carnival in June 2019.
- 4. Invitations to contribute to the Cricket Green Charter refresh and links to the draft were publicised via:
 - Over 4,500 hand delivered bulletins to homes through Cricket Green
 - A specially convened workshop Cricket Green: the next 50 years in the Vestry Hall attended by nearly 30, including local councillors, and with presentations from Merton Council's futureMerton team
 - Direct mailings to members of Mitcham Cricket Green Community & Heritage and over 750 other contacts
 - Monthly Open Meetings of Mitcham Cricket Green Community & Heritage
 - Social media (Twitter & Facebook) generating c1.5k impressions on Twitter
